Our Business

The Hank Young Foundation is a charitable trust fund established in 1989 by Mr Hank Young AM. With the support of his brother, Colin Young, the Foundation is able to provide guidance and financial support to projects associated with the education and welfare of Australia's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People.

The main objective of the Foundation is to use and hold the trust fund and any income thereof for the welfare and education of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People, specific objectives include:

to provide finance and other support for activities contributing to the relief of poverty including without limiting the generality of the foregoing, activities contributing to income generation, job creation and micro, small and medium businesses and other self-help activities;

to identify, support, initiate, control and conduct effective educational institutions and programs;

to identify, support, initiate, control and fund non-profit activities, such as workshops, co-operatives and other similar non-profit projects;

to identify, initiate, develop, control and fund projects for housing, accommodation, community welfare and development projects, including health and services, child care, hostels and retirement homes;

to fund scholarships for Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander students and provide funds to individual Indigenous students;

to employ staff for, and assist with social, pastoral and welfare activities, including homeless, youth and prisoners;

to provide and fund leadership training in education, business and social, pastoral or welfare work;

to fund research programs;

to provide funds to other charitable funds, institutions and associations

Our Projects

PROJECT 1: RIVERMOUNT COLLEGE, YATALA, QUEENSLAND

(Established in 1991)

Rivermount College was established by The Hank Young Foundation with the specific purpose of building bridges between the indigenous and non-indigenous people of Australia. Throughout the entire curriculum, from Prep to Year 12, the Foundation seeks to provide educational, vocational and developmental courses that aim to disseminate information that will support a greater awareness of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders, their history, conditions and general welfare and education.

The Hank Young Foundation acknowledges the support and commitment of the late Dr Neville Bonner AO as the Founding Patron of Rivermount College.

The College provides a non-denominational co-educational Christian education for students from Prep to Year 12. The campus is located approximately half way between Brisbane and the Gold Coast. The traditional owners of the land are the Kombumerri People. It is the vision of the Founders that Rivermount College will promote awareness of and appreciation for the rich and diverse culture of the Indigenous people of Australia. It is the aim of the Foundation that, as a leader in education, Rivermount College will proactively support the building of a community that embraces a future built on unity and harmony.

Our Projects

PROJECT 2: SEED FUNDING FOR INDIGENOUS PROJECTS (North Stradbroke Island—Minjerribah)

In 2007 The Foundation established a working relationship with the Indigenous people of North Stradbroke Island. The Foundation has provided seed funding to the Salt Water Indigenous Art Society and the Minjerribah Respite Centre to assist with the ongoing work and future development of these organisations.

The Hank Young Foundation has established a working relationship with Mrs Margaret Iselin, Elder of the Minjerribah/Moorgumpin Council on North Stradbroke Island.

The Indigenous people of North Stradbroke Island have a traditional heritage that stretches back to 1803 when Matthew Flinders, the first recorded European landed and came into contact with the local Aboriginal people.

Minjerribah is the traditional Indigenous name for North Stradbroke Island. The traditional land owners of the Island are the Nunukal, Nughie & Goenpil peoples. The Indigenous people of North Stradbroke Island have a close affiliation with the Moorgumpin people of Moreton Island. This was a result a traditional relationship formed before the separating of the two islands thousands of years ago.

The Island of North Stradbroke is located 30 km southeast of Brisbane

PROJECT 3: RADIANT LIFE COLLEGE, INNISFAIL QLD

In 2007 The Hank Young Foundation sought Government approval to establish an additional campus of Rivermount College at Innisfail in North Queensland. It was anticipated that the Innisfail campus would commence in January 2008. Former students of Innisfail Christian College (Radiant Life College) will receive financial support from the Foundation in 2008.

The Foundation has allocated funds to develop the facilities and educational programs of the campus to cater for Indigenous and non-Indigenous students in the region.

Radiant Life College is located in the Johnstone Shire of Innisfail, North Queensland. The Hank Foundation is committed to working with Pastors Anthony and Selena Edwards to establish a non-denominational Christian College for Indigenous and non-Indigenous students.

The community of Innisfail is populated by a substantial percentage of Indigenous people of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander descent. It is envisaged that the campus will attract additional students from Papua New Guinea.

The Ma:Mu people are the traditional owners of the land in the region of Innisfail.
